- 7. If legal, political and economic factors trend toward amendments to the Estate and Gift Tax laws, and/or imposition of carry-over basis with a partial step-up, we will work toward minimizing tax liability, including taking full advantage of any available basis step-up.
- 8. Recommend estate planning documents that provide flexibility for fiduciaries to make basis allocations to maximize tax advantage.
